2023 ADMISSIONS ARE OPEN!

BCCA just ramped up its admission process this month. We are heightening our focus on outreach and diversity to increase the number of students we can recruit and ensure our classes better represent the communities we serve. To accomplish these two objectives, we have made some changes to our admissions process and increased our

presence at career fairs and schools across north MS.

New this year: we have already started accepting nominations and applications, a shift from waiting until January as we've done in years past. We continue to require a nomination and application before first

interviews, however based on feedback from our nominators we believe we will reach more students by starting our process earlier in the year. Our outreach has expanded to include career fairs, (four to date!) in parallel with trips to classrooms across the state to make sure Mississippi's high school students know about Software Development as a career option, and Base Camp as a pathway to that career. In the coming months we will be in the schools within our commuting distance to make sure every student that needs Base Camp knows we are here for them.

As a reminder, we have our own, unique, admission process. We do not review student GPAs or test scores to make selection decisions, and we do not expect students to know how to program to be admitted to Base Camp.

Our selection process is solely based on the Nominator's recommendation, the Student's application, the Student's response to the programming and aptitude challenges they are provided by Base Camp, and the Student's performance during the two rounds of interviews.

Technical Progress

The class of 2021 is now over 4 months into their year with Base Camp!

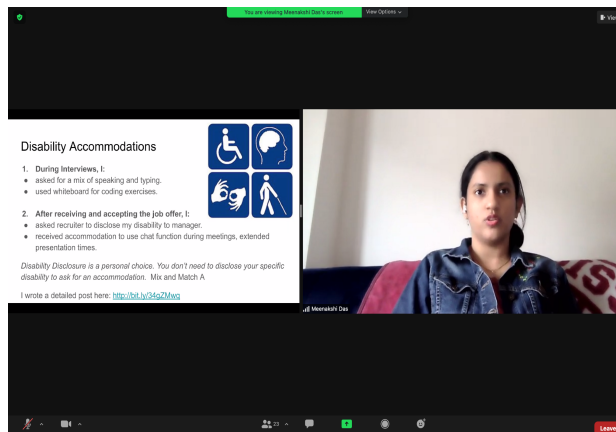
For the past five weeks, Base Camp students have been learning to use Django to build sites with user-generated relational data. The objectives of this unit are to develop dynamic, database-backed websites, understand the basics of HTTP, process user input, and design a simple database scheme. At the end of the unit, students will present to their peers their original projects, demonstrating the storage and retrieval processes using databases they developed.

Base Camp students demonstrate their expanded skills throughout the year by applying them to projects. Literally they build things with code, over and over, as a foundational learning principle, as well as the most transparent way for each of them to demonstrate their abilities to future employers.

Edney and Das Visit BCCA

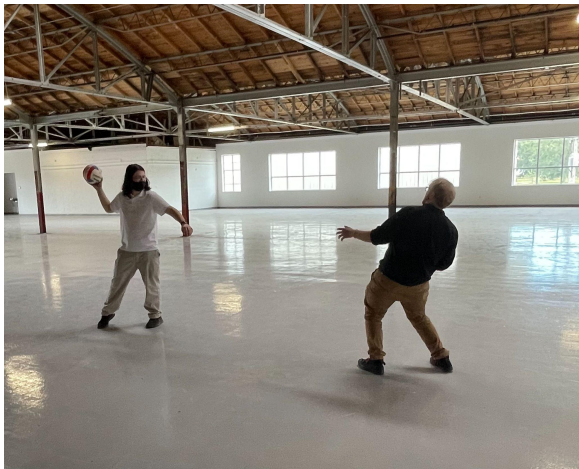
